

The Merge Calculator






A quick and easy way to calculate the liability and savings resulting from a merge of (up to) five properties into one.

Select the location (England, Greater London, or City of London) then enter the details of the new property at the top




If you enter an effective date of 1/4/17 you will be given the option to enter a Certified Value at 31/3/17 (i.e. Regulation 18). See below.

If the effective date is 1/4/17 and you do **not** enter a Certified Value, the calculator will use the formula R x J / S (Schedule 2) to calculate liability on the new property.



If the effective date is after 1/4/17 the Certified Value fields will not be displayed – see below

In this example a new hereditament with an RV of 56,000 is created on 1/11/17 from a merge of RV's 23,000 and 32,000

Enter the RV of the old properties at the bottom, i.e. the RV at 31/3/17, the RV at 1/4/17, and the RV on the day before the merge (if different) as illustrated in the following exercise.

Exercise - Merge, England (not London)

Property 1 - RV at 31/3/17 46,000 | RV at 1/4/17 23,000 | RV on day before merge 23,000


Property 2 – RV at 31/3/17 64,000 | RV at 1/4/17 32,000 | RV on day before merge 32,000

Merged with effect from 1/11/17 at RV 56,000

What are the savings, if any?


Enter the new RV and the effective date in the top section



Calcurate Page 3 of 4

Enter the RV details of the two original (or parent) properties in the bottom section, then click the "Calculate" button. You will see the following warning.


(the reason for the warning is that the Merge Calculator uses the Advanced Calculator therefore you will lose any calculations you have been working on)



Click Yes - wait - you will see the following



As you can see, in this case there is a negative saving – i.e. an increase.
